## **Jefferson Davis Award**

Awarded for distinguished book-length narrative history or monograph published in 2018. All nominations should be submitted by December 31, 2018.

## **Founders Award**

Awarded for excellence in the editing of primary source materials published in 2017 and 2018. All nominations should be submitted by December 31, 2018.

The award consists of a framed certificate bearing a red wax impression from the original Great Seal of the Confederacy.

The Jefferson Davis Award also carries a modest cash prize.
